"Hello and How are You?"

On Saturday, October 24, the Eastern Region Music Special Interest Council hosted a professional development session centered on Orff methodology. Teachers gathered at Holy Family Elementary to hear Rose Suter discuss Orff in her classroom, how she structures class sessions, and how the principles of Orff methodology shape her lesson planning.

It was a fantastic morning of resource sharing. We opened the morning with a wel come song, "Hello and How are You?" and we were able to greet each other as we began the structured lesson. Rhythms were created and shared in each element of the class. We began the morning by echoing a rondo form. Later, we used hand drums to steer carloads of our colleagues in a rhythm ride around the classroom.

A personal highpoint was the insight into how Rose plans and implements lessons. Leading up to Halloween she had planned a series of lessons on bugs. We learned a quick chant using words that began with B, A, and G, and in a very short time, we had created a new song on the recorder using eighth, quarter and half notes – and even some harmony! This was an interesting way of incorporating notes and fingerings, before adding notation, a struggle for some early recorder learners. Rose also shared several composition, creation, and evaluation games, all with bugs and insects as the theme.

We concluded the morning with Orff instrumentations for several Christmas carols – some inspiration for the coming weeks!

We were encouraged to incorporate these ideas in our lessons and engage our students in new and exciting ways. It was certainly an informative, productive, and inspiring morning.

ilnspire Ontario Music Educators Conference

On the weekend of November 5-7 I had the privilege of attending the Ontario Music Educators Conference, ilnspire, which was held in Mississauga, Ontario. This annual conference is held in various locations in Ontario and this year's conference brought together over a thousand music teachers for professional development, growth and connection.

Over the two days of the conference there were a variety of concerts and cameo performances from local school and university ensembles and sessions ranging from exploring Primary music classroom techniques, Jazz band tactics, to fostering social justice in the music classroom. During each session there was the 18 sessions running concurrently. Something for every educator that was present. During the conference I attended many sessions that applied to my current teaching assignment, Mount Pearl Intermediate. Many lesson ideas and new ideas were shared in the sessions and I especially enjoyed the keynote speaker, author and teacher Barbara Freedman, who spoke of her knowledge and experiences with technology in the music classroom.

I was excited to see the wide variety of music resources, instruments and related items in the exhibitor area of the conference. There was a vast array of instrument makers and music publishing companies. It was quite the impressive selection and it felt a little like Christmas morning for all the music teachers that attended.

One of the highlights of the conference was the session I attended on teaching middle school band. This session was led by a knowledgeable middle school educator and author, Marguerite Wilder. Much insight was given to teaching this age group, technique for teaching music literacy and the psychology of working with this age group. Her presentation was packed with wit and wisdom and I left the session feeling refreshed.

I wish to thank the NLTA Programs and Services and Cultural Connections, Department of Education for their financial help in making this experience possible for me to attend. It was refreshing to meet music educators from another part of the country and to know that our successes and struggles are very much the same. It was inspiring to meet like-minded music educators and to know we are a strong network of professionals who have a passion for music and passing that love to the next generation. I would highly recommend the conference to any music educator who is looking to be inspired and renewed.
