

General Public Survey 2016 Budget Reaction

June 28th 2016





Research Objectives and Methodology

- The main purpose of this research was to survey the general public, with an additional focus on parents, on issues related to Budget 2016 and gauge awareness and understanding of the potential impact of the budget on the quality of the education system.
- A telephone survey of the general public, with an additional focus on parents.
 - ☐ General Public = 412 completed surveys
 - □ Parents =150 completed surveys
- □ The survey was conducted between June 2nd and June 10th, 2016.
- Overall margin of error is:
 - General Public = \pm 4.8%, 19 out of 20 times, or at the 95% confidence level
 - \square Parents = +/- 8.0%, 19 out of 20 times, or at the 95% confidence level
- □ A profile of the survey respondents is provided in the following table.




Section 1: Overall Reactions

Unaided Responses





Awareness was consistent among the public and parents, with the majority reporting they are *somewhat aware* of the impact to the education system.



Both the general public and parents feel the budget will have a negative impact on the overall quality of education delivered in the province. In particular, *increased class sizes* and *loss of teachers* were seen as having the most negative impact on education.

The majority of both the general public and parents felt all budget issues listed would have a negative impact on the quality education in the province; however, parents were slightly more likely to feel this way.





Now that you have heard more about the specific issues - in your view, what impact will the budget have on the overall quality of education delivered in the province?






Section 2: Understanding of the Issues

Both parents and the general public are conflicted about the impact of full-day kindergarten – some believe it will have a *very negative impact*, some believe it will have a *very positive impact*, and many reported the impact will be relatively neutral.



What impact do you think the implementation of full-day kindergarten will have on the quality of education in the province?




Both parents and the general public are split on the importance of implementing full-day kindergarten – among both groups of respondents about half reported it was *very/somewhat important* and the other half reported that it was *not important*.

■ Very important ■ Somewhat important ■ Not important ■ Don't know








Do you feel you have a good, fair, or poor understanding of multi-grading?

Do you feel you have a good, fair, or poor understanding of multi-grading?



The majority of both the general public and parents disagreed with the budget decision to increase the number of multi-grading classrooms. Parents tend to hold stronger views as shown by a higher proportion who *completely disagree*.



Based on what you have heard or seen, how do you feel about teacher's and their association's response to the current budget?






Section 3: Parents' Attitudes




Do you feel there are currently enough teachers allocated to teach the required curriculum?



Parents think the ideal number of allowable students per class should gradually increase by grade - Kindergarten should have an average of 18 students, while Grade 10-12 should have an average of 26 students per class.




Thinking of the maximum allowable students per class, what do you feel would be the ideal?

Key Findings



- 1. Awareness of the impact of the budget to the education system was consistent among the general public and parents the majority reported they are *somewhat aware* of the impact of the budget on education.
- 2. Impact of the 2016 Budget on Education
 - Both the general public and parents agree that the budget will have a negative impact on the quality of education in the province.
 - Negative impacts most often mentioned were increased class sizes and loss of teachers.
 - When asked to rate the impact of the budget on a series of items related to the education system, over 75% of the general public and 85% of parents reported a negative impact resulting from:
 - Loss of supports for special needs students;
 - Loss of teachers; and
 - Reduction of physical space/overcrowding.

Key Findings



- 2. Impact of the 2016 Budget on Education (cont'd)
 - Both parents and the general public are split about the impact of full-day kindergarten and the importance of implementing it.
 - The majority of both the general public and parents disagreed with the budget decision to increase the number of multi-grading classrooms and parents tended to hold stronger views on multigrading.

3. Parent's Attitudes

- The majority of parents to not feel there are currently enough teachers allocated to teach the required curriculum.
- The vast majority of parents had an unfavorable attitude toward their child being placed in a combined or multi-graded classroom.

Key Findings



- 4. NLTA's Response to the 2016 Budget
 - Both the general public and parents feel that teacher's and their association's response to the budget is on track or could be more vocal.
 - Most parents and the general public believe that teachers and their association should be fighting to repeal increased class sizes and multi-grading.

Conclusions



The NLTA is on the right track and should continue to fight to repeal key Budget 2016 decisions impacting the quality of education in NL: increased class sizes, loss of teachers, and multi-grading/combined classrooms.
